

CITY OF FOLSOM TO RECEIVE \$4 MILLION FOR RILEY STREET ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROJECT

The City of Folsom is set to receive \$4 million in federal funding for Riley Street safety improvements, including upgraded sidewalks and new bike lanes. The Riley Street project was included as a Community Project Funding request in the FY23 House Transportation, Housing and Urban Development (THUD) Appropriations bill.

The upcoming project will benefit the Folsom community by improving pedestrian safety and connectivity from the Central Business District and Sutter Middle School to the Historic District and light rail station. The city will add sidewalks and bike lanes along Riley Street from East Bidwell Street to Sutter Street. Rep. Ami Bera helped secure the funds for the project as part of a push to expand and improve the Sacramento region's roadways, bike lanes, and public transportation options.

Every three years, the California Building Code is updated and then adopted by the City of Folsom. The updated Code includes clarifications, new requirements, or revisions to the current building requirements. The new 2022 Triennial Edition was released in July and will be adopted and then implemented January 1, 2023.

SIGNIFICANT CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODE UPDATES

- >> Fire sprinklers required for all new single-family residences or duplexes (2010 Update).
- Accessibility requirements reformatted and reorganized to align with Federal Standards (2013 Update).
- >> Electric Vehicle infrastructure required for all new construction (2016 Update).
- >> Photovoltaic systems required for all new low-rise residential buildings (2019 Update).

Enjoy a safe and happy Halloween with these tips from the Folsom Police Department:

- >> Be Safe. Be Seen. Choose light or brightly colored costumes and add reflective tape or striping to the costume and trick or treat bags. Have each child carry a flashlight with fresh batteries and/or a glow stick.
- >> Make a Plan. Before leaving your home, plan your route and discuss appropriate behavior that you expect from your child. Have a meeting point in case you and your child get separated and set a time for older children to return home.
- >> Candy Check. Check for loose wrappers and holes in any candy or wrapper before letting your child eat any of it. Discard homemade treats unless you know and trust the person who gave it to your child.
- **>> Home Safe.** Don't open the door for anyone who makes you feel uncomfortable, and never let strangers inside your home.
- >> See Something, Say Something. Report suspicious activity to the Folsom Police Department at 916-461-6400.

National Fire Prevention Week is October 9 through 15. This year's theme, "Fire Won't Wait; Plan Your Escape" reinforces the critical importance of developing a home escape plan. Regularly practicing your home escape plan with all household members helps ensure that everyone knows what to do when the smoke alarm sounds and uses that time wisely.

The Folsom Fire Department offers important guidance:

- Make sure your home escape plan meets the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- >> Include your pets in the escape plan.

- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected so that when one sounds, they all sound.
- >> Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows open easily.
- >> Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home.
- Practice your home fire drill at least twice a year with everyone in the household, including guests. Practice at least once during the day and at night.

Work is underway on an annual street maintenance project on various arterial roadways throughout Folsom. The project consists of localized asphalt repairs, application of a slurry seal, and new roadway striping with buffered bike lanes. The slurry seal creates a new wearing surface and seals the asphalt to prevent the damaging effects of water intrusion into the pavement.

The following roads will receive the slurry treatment this year:

- >> Iron Point Road between Folsom Boulevard and Ingersoll Way.
- >> Iron Point Road between East Bidwell Street and McAdoo Drive.
- >> Broadstone Parkway between East Bidwell Street and Iron Point Road.
- Oak Avenue Parkway between American River Canyon Drive and Baldwin Dam Road.

Work will take place from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and will continue until late September. At least one single lane will remain open to traffic at all times.

FOLSOM PUTS FOOD WASTE IN ITS PLACE: GREEN BIN PROGRAM UPDATE

Folsom's organics recycling program is off to a great start thanks to residents and businesses who are leveraging their new green bins to recycle food and yard waste. The program is designed to help preserve Folsom's distinctive natural environment.

Now, organic material from Folsom homes and businesses, including food scraps, food-soiled paper, and lawn and leaf clippings, is transformed into compost for farms, gardens, and parks to use. This exciting program is part of a statewide effort to lower greenhouse gas emissions by reducing the amount of organic material sent to California landfills.

The city is launching the program one community at a time, and if you don't have green bin service yet, don't worry—it will be coming to you soon.

WHAT GOES IN THE GREEN BIN?

- >> Single family homes can now add bagged food scraps and food-soiled paper to their existing yard waste bins, now called the "green organics bin," for weekly pickup.
- Make sure to bag your food scraps and food-soiled paper in clear plastic or compostable bags. These materials will be separated from yard waste and sent to a composting facility in Yolo County.

>> Lawn and leaf clippings should be placed loose in your bin, as usual.

HALLOWEEN TIPS

- You can place pumpkins and jack-o'-lanterns in your Green Bin for composting. There's no need to bag them.
- >> Please remove any candles or lights before tossing pumpkins into your bin.
- >> Dispose of painted pumpkins in the trash.

FREE COMPOST AND KITCHEN PAIL PICKUP

- Folsom residents can spruce up home landscapes and gardens with free, locally-made compost and mulch. The items are available at two self-serve locations: behind City Hall at 50 Natoma Street and at Hinkle Creek Nature Trail near Fire Station 36.
- >> The city will continue to host kitchen pail pickup events. Check the city website calendar for upcoming dates and locations.

Election Day is November 8. Make your voice heard! Choose how, when, and where you want to vote:

- >>> By Mail: Registered voters will be mailed an official ballot beginning October 10. If you do not receive your ballot or need a replacement ballot, call Sacramento Voter Registrations at 916-875-6155 or email vbm@saccounty.net. You may vote by returning your ballot by mail.
- Ballot Drop Box: Completed ballots may also be placed in any of the secured Ballot Drop Box locations throughout Sacramento County beginning October 10. There will be a Ballot Drop Box inside Folsom City Hall, 50 Natoma Street, available to the public from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Other Ballot Drop Box locations can be found online at elections.saccounty.net.
- >> Vote Center: All Vote Centers will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. four days prior to and including Election Day, and some of the Vote Centers will open up to 11 days prior to and including Election Day. You can visit any Vote Center in the county to drop off completed ballots or vote in person. Vote Center locations in Folsom can be found online at elections.saccounty.net.

In addition to the general election, Folsom voters will elect three City Councilmembers in the city's first by-district election. There are two key changes in by-district City Council elections:

- 1. Voters will only vote for one Councilmember, instead of all five.
- 2. Councilmembers must live in the district they represent.

 Members of the City Council from Council Districts 1, 3, and 5 will be elected on a by-district basis.
