# SUMMER FUN AT THE AQUATIC CENTER

The aquatic center's summer season begins Saturday, May 27.



The City of Folsom Waste and Reycling Division team recently visited hundreds of households for the first in a series of route reviews. Route reviews are random, periodic visual audits of curbside garbage, recycling, and organics cans to encourage residents to recycle right.

State of California law SB 1383 requires jurisdictions to conduct route reviews. The City of Folsom route reviews are an opportunity to educate the community about recycling and leave real-time, actionable feedback through bin tags. The route reviews also provide valuable information that will shape future education and outreach efforts.


Waste and Recycling staff members work in groups or pairs, wearing high-visibility vests and identification badges. Material will never be removed from the cans, and cans will only be reviewed when they are placed curbside for service.

In March, the Waste and Reycling Division team visited nearly 700 addresses and recognized more than 250 households for outstanding recycling practices, including bagging food scraps in clear plastic or compostable bags.

#### **RECYCLE RIGHT TIPS:**

- >> Loose bags and bagged recyclables are not permitted in the blue bin. Collecting recyclables in a bag? Simply empty contents, such as plastic containers, glass bottles, and aluminum cans, directly into the blue bin.
- Plastic film packaging, envelopes, and bubble wrap are not recyclable. Place these items in your gray garbage bin.

# FOLSOM BOULEVARD BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN OVERCROSSING STUDY BEGINS

To improve safety and close a gap in the Humbug-Willow Creek Trail system, the City of Folsom Parks & Recreation Department has begun a feasibility study for a new bicycle and pedestrian bridge over Folsom Boulevard between Blue Ravine Road and Glenn Drive. The city was awarded an American Rescue Plan Act grant to fund this study, which will identify the preferred alignment location and a conceptual architectural design of the bridge. The goal of the feasibility study is to identify a safe, convenient, and cost-effective active transportation connection


across Folsom Boulevard, linking transit, neighborhoods, businesses, and recreational attractions such as the Folsom Lake State Recreation Area.


The city has identified four preliminary alignment alternatives for the overcrossing. To gather input from the public, the city is hosting an Online Community Questionnaire until May 12, which is available at www.bit.ly/FolsomOvercrossing. #### SUMMER FUN AT THE AQUATIC CENTER

The aquatic center's summer season begins May 27 for daily recreation swim from 1 to 5 p.m. through September 4. The trained lifeguarding staff are always on duty during recreation swim. Guests can enjoy all the great amenities: the interactive play structure, two-story water slide, diving boards, three pools, and the giant inflatable obstacle courses (requires a \$3 wristband).

Dry vegetation can create fire hazards during hot summer months. Folsom has more than 980 acres of city-owned open space, and nearly all of it is weed abated to achieve the required fire safety interface between residential structures and open spaces.

The City of Folsom requires defensible space of at least 30 feet from structures or the property line and the Fire Chief may increase this distance to 100 feet for high-hazard areas. These requirements apply to city-owned property and private property.

The city uses multiple ways to reduce or remove dry vegetation including maintenance staff, contractors, and grazing animals. Many Folsom residents are likely to see goat herds being used to clear areas in and around their neighborhood over the next few months. Goats will be used to clear 800 acres of open space in the city this year. The herds of fourlegged weed eaters are taking on hundreds of additional acres that were historically cleared with human work crews in the past.

The weed abatement schedule is based on fire hazard ratings determined by the Fire Chief. If you notice an area in need of weed abatement, first check the abatement schedules at www.folsom.ca.us. If you'd like to report an unscheduled weed abatement need on vacant private property, use SeeClickFix Folsom or contact the Folsom Fire Department at 916-461-6300.

# REBATE PROGRAM FOR FOLSOM WATER SERVICE CUSTOMERS

City of Folsom water service customers can now save up to \$170 on a Rachio 3 Smart Sprinkler Controller through a rebate program offered by the City of Folsom in partnership with the Regional Water Authority and local water providers.

The Rachio 3 Controller acts like a thermostat for your sprinklers, using local weather conditions to adjust how long your sprinklers run. You can also manage the controller from your smart phone with the Rachio app.

It's estimated that replacing a standard controller with a WaterSense-labeled smart controller like the Rachio 3 can save an average home about 13,500 gallons of water per year. The Rachio 3 Smart Sprinkler Controller is being offered at a reduced price of \$75. Rebates are available for a limited time on a first-come, first-served basis. Sign up at rwa.rachio.com.

Water-wise landscapes are good for you and good for Folsom. Replacing your traditional lawn with California-friendly trees and plants will help you conserve water, save money, and benefit the environment. When maintained correctly, water-efficient gardens are beautiful. They're also easier and less time-consuming to maintain than lawns. These stunning, colorful landscapes also attract hummingbirds, butterflies, and other beneficial species to our community.

- >> Low maintenance doesn't mean no maintenance. Weed for a few minutes every two weeks to keep your landscape looking fresh.
- Water-efficient landscapes are beautiful and natural. Avoid shearing plants into hard geometric shapes. Hard shearing prevents blooming, creates panic growth, and increases water use.
- >> Use organic mulch. It will slowly decompose and improve the organic content of your soil.
- >> Keep the mulch at least three inches deep to inhibit weed growth and eliminate the need for weed cloth.
- The City of Folsom provides free mulch and compost at two self-serve locations: Behind City Hall at 50 Natoma Street and at Fire Station 36 (next to the sandbag location on Oak Avenue Parkway). Please bring your own shovels and containers.
