

CITY OF FOLSOM FACES FISCAL CROSSROADS

The Folsom City Council recently directed staff to begin a public education effort to inform the community about the city's finances, projected structural deficit, and potential future impacts on the Folsom community. While the City of Folsom currently has a stable financial status, an Aa2 credit rating, and reserves in the rainy-day fund, significant fiscal challenges lie ahead.

At issue is the city's financial future, which relies heavily on the strength of its largest operating fund, the General Fund. That fund faces a financial shortfall that could impact public services and Folsom's local quality of life. The Folsom City Council continues to weigh options to address the city's structural deficit.

Amidst the projected structural deficit, the city faces compounding infrastructure and building maintenance needs that require a dedicated funding source. There is an estimated \$20 million annual shortfall in funding for public safety, street repairs, infrastructure improvements, park and facility repairs, equipment maintenance and replacements, trail maintenance and repairs, and staffing needs.

The city's General Fund no longer covers the cost of providing city services or maintaining the city's aging infrastructure. Even with Folsom's current sales tax, which makes up about 25% of the General Fund revenue annually, the city's five-year projection predicts its structural deficit will grow as the cost of delivering services outpaces revenue growth.

The Folsom Fire Department offers these important tips to stay safe this Fourth of July:

- ▶ Be sure to purchase "Safe and Sane" fireworks that display the State Fire Marshal's seal.
- ▶ Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.
- Always read the directions and warning labels on fireworks. If a device is not marked with instructions and a warning label, do not light it.
- When using legal fireworks, only set them off outdoors in a clear area that is away from homes, dry leaves, grass, and other flammable materials.
- ▶ Always supervise children around fireworks.
- Do not try to relight or handle malfunctioning fireworks.
- Always have a bucket of water and/or a fire extinguisher nearby. Know how to operate the fire extinguisher properly.
- ▶ Fireworks are prohibited in all city-owned properties and parks except at the Lembi Community Park parking lot. The use of fireworks on all trails and open spaces in the City of Folsom is prohibited.

KEEP IT SAFE, KEEP IT LEGAL

The City of Folsom enforces stricter penalties for illegal fireworks usage. The Folsom City Council adopted a social host ordinance that levies \$1,000 fines against property owners that either use or allow the use of illegal fireworks on their property. Calls for service increase dramatically on July 4, and emergency response resources are stretched extremely thin. During the holiday weekend, use 9-1-1 for emergencies only, like an active fire, injury, or an immediate threat to people or property.

SUMMER SAFETY AND RULES OF THE ROAD FOR E-BIKES, E-SCOOTERS, AND E-MOTORCYCLES

Summer has arrived, which means more Folsom residents, including local students on summer break, are out enjoying the season on electric scooters, e-bikes, and electric motorcycles. Because these two-wheeled vehicles are self-propelled, they are subject to the California Vehicle Code.

Here are a few key rules to help riders stay safe. Failure to comply with these rules may result in citations and vehicle impoundment.

All riders:

▶ Helmets are recommended for everyone and required for riders under 18.

E-scooters:

- Riders must be 16 or older, have a California driver's license or instructional permit, and only ride solo.
- Stay off the sidewalks, and follow a speed limit of 15 mph.

E-bikes:

- ▶ Class 1 and 2 e-bikes have no age restriction. Speed must be kept under 15 mph on trails and streets with 25 mph or lower limits.
- Class 3 riders must be 16 or older.

E-motorcycles:

- Any electric-powered self-propelled device faster than 30 mph is considered an e-motorcycle.
- ▶ Riders need a California driver's license with an M1 or M2 endorsement and vehicle registration to ride on the street.
- No riding on trails, bike lanes, or sidewalks.

FOLSOM RESIDENTS PUBLIC SAFETY AND QUALITY OF LIFE INITIATIVE QUALIFIES FOR NOVEMBER 2024 BALLOT

At its May 28 meeting, the Folsom City Council approved Resolution No. 11207, a legally required action to place the citizen-led Folsom Residents Public Safety and Quality of Life Initiative on the November 2024 ballot, allowing voters to decide on a special sales tax to fund city services and other critical needs.

Ballot Measure G, titled the "Folsom Residents Public Safety and Quality of Life Act," seeks to increase the sales tax rate in the city by one percent (i.e., one cent on every dollar spent). All funds generated by the proposed measure would stay in Folsom to provide essential city services, programming, and infrastructure improvements.

Measure G proposes a 1 cent sales tax increase where all funds would be deposited into a special city account separate from the General Fund for the city to use only for the following specific purposes:

- ▶ Police and crime reduction.
- Fire, rescue, and emergency medical services.
- Parks, recreation facilities, and trails.
- Traffic mitigation and environmental water quality.
- Community enhancement and economic development.
- Major capital improvement projects.

To pass, Measure G must receive approval from a majority of Folsom voters (50% + 1) who vote on the measure in the November 5, 2024 Election. Learn more about Measure G at www.folsom.ca.us/elections.



JOIN THE FOLSOM COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

Volunteer with the Folsom Fire Department's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and become vital to our community's emergency response efforts. During major incidents in Folsom and the surrounding areas, CERT volunteers support firefighters, police, and other first responders. Additionally, CERT volunteers provide essential community training on disaster preparedness and response.

How to Join

The first step to joining the team is to attend CERT training. This comprehensive program covers:

- Assisting family members and neighbors before emergency responders arrive.
- Disaster preparedness.
- First aid.
- Search and rescue.
- ▶ Emergency response plans.

Upon completing the training and passing a background check, participants may be eligible to volunteer for CERT.

FROM THE ARCHIVES: FOLSOM'S FIERY PAST

Throughout the 19th century, Folsom was plagued by frequent fires, which were particularly devastating to Sutter Street and the surrounding areas due to the lack of a water supply until the 1890s. In 1886, a significant fire razed a block of buildings in Chinatown, leading to widespread destruction of shops. Reconstruction efforts focused on using brick and stone to prevent future blazes. The Folsom Hook and Ladder Company, formed in 1857, initially protected the Sutter Street area and later evolved into the town's official fire department. Their base, Firemen's Hall, stood on the corner of Sutter Street and Wool Street. The City of Folsom residential Green Bin Program, introduced in 2022 to comply with SB 1383, has reached a milestone as the city recognizes the program's second anniversary.

Since the program's inception, participation has steadily increased. Since July 2022, Folsom residents and businesses have collectively diverted over 25,000 tons of organic material from the landfill!

Residents are encouraged to continue the progress by collecting food scraps and food-soiled paper in a clear plastic or compostable bag and tossing it in their Green Bin, along with loose yard trimmings for weekly pick up. This diversion not only provides a valuable feedstock for compost production but also helps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Folsom residents can benefit from the city's commitment to sustainability. Free compost and mulch are available year-round at two locations: behind City Hall at 50 Natoma Street and at the Hinkle Creek Nature Trail, next to Fire Station 36 at 9700 Oak Avenue Parkway.

The City of Folsom is asking residents to check their drinking water pipes as part of a nationwide effort to locate and remove lead service pipes within water systems. The city is completing the service line inventory to comply with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Lead and Copper Rule Revisions.

Why does the city need this information?

▶ The survey will allow the city to document the presence or absence of lead service pipes in the water system.

About your drinking water.

- ▶ Your drinking water is free of lead when it leaves the water treatment plant. However, water can absorb lead if it travels through lead pipes on your property.
- ▶ The city only maintains a portion of the service line, and each homeowner is responsible for the other portion that goes into your home's structure.

Who should complete the survey?

- Residents living in homes built before 1986 should complete the survey.
- Residents living in homes built after 1986 do not need to fill out the survey. The EPA banned the use of lead materials (pipe and solder) for drinking water distribution in 1986.
