LATE CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

You can still recycle your Christmas tree, even if you missed local tree recycling pick up events. Christmas trees can be recycled in your green waste bin. Trees must be cut into pieces no larger than two feet in length and four inches in diameter, and the lid must close completely to receive service. Remove all ornaments, tinsel, lights, nails, and stands before placing in the green waste bin. Flocked

trees cannot be accepted.



As a reminder, the city collects garbage, green waste, and recycling on all holidays, so place cans out on your normal collection day.

THE R.E.C. CLUB KEEPS KIDS BUSY AND ENGAGED

Zoning Code Update

The City of Folsom zoning code regulates existing and new development and specifies appropriate land uses in Folsom. The city is updating its zoning code with the goal of creating clear expectations for quality development and regulations that are easy to understand and follow. Zoning regulations can affect land use, design, parcel size, building heights, density, setbacks, landscaping, fencing, and other aspects of property use.

The zoning code draft will be presented to the Planning Commission, Historic District Commission, and Folsom City Council for review and adoption this spring. A series of virtual workshops and public meetings are planned in January and February, and public participation is encouraged.


CONSIDERING A HOME IMPROVEMENT IN 2021? YOU MAY NEED A BUILDING PERMIT

When you plan for a home improvement project, you probably spend time considering style, color, and whether you'll need to hire a contractor or architect. But don't forget one more important step: determining whether your project requires a building permit from the City of Folsom. Building permits are required for most construction or remodeling projects. A permit is typically not needed for painting your home, adding cabinets, changing floor coverings, replacing countertops, and other similar cosmetic improvements.

YOU WILL LIKELY NEED A PERMIT FOR:

- New construction
- Home additions
- Home alterations or demolitions
- Patio covers

- Re-roofing
- Retaining walls taller than 3 feet
- Electrical, plumbing, and mechanical work



IMPORTANT BENEFITS OF PERMITS AND INSPECTIONS

SAFETY: Your project is checked to ensure that it meets building safety standards.


QUALITY: Permits and inspections help ensure the quality of your remodeling investment and are important to the value of your property.

LEGAL: Building permits are required by state and local laws. Unless voluntarily corrected, illegally conducted work may incur costs for citations, permits, and reconstruction.



Topping Hurts Trees

Topping of trees—leaving trunks with stubby limbs—is recognized by the City of Folsom, the State of California, and arborists as a harmful and unacceptable practice. It can cause a multitude of problems that often result in either the death of the tree or weakened limbs falling on people or property.



Tree topping is illegal in the City of Folsom for any tree that is considered a protected tree—including native oak trees, privately-owned trees that are within 12.5 feet of the sidewalk or right of way, heritage trees, and trees on commercial properties that were planted as part of the original development. Pruning or removal of any protected tree requires a City of Folsom tree permit. When you obtain a tree permit, the city arborist can provide guidance to help you protect your property and trees.

TO BURN OR NOT TO BURN-TIME TO CHECK

It's the season to Check Before You Burn. Through the end of February, residents and businesses in Sacramento County, including Folsom, must check the daily burn status before using a wood-burning fireplace or other wood-burning devices.

This is due to the Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District's Check Before You Burn law.



No Burn days are called when weather conditions trap wood smoke near the ground. To protect public

health and achieve federal air quality standards, it's illegal to burn wood, pellets, manufactured logs, or any other solid fuel when fine particle pollution (PM2.5) is forecast to be high. This applies to indoor or outdoor fireplaces, wood stoves, fire pits, and chimineas.

Here's how to Check Before You Burn:

HOW TO RECYCLE USED BATTERIES

New toys and electronics could mean old, unwanted batteries. In California, batteries are considered hazardous waste when they are discarded. This includes AAA, AA, C, D, button cell, 9-volt, and all other batteries, both rechargeable and single-use. If your old batteries end up in a landfill, pollutants can leak out and contaminate groundwater. Lithium batteries can cause fires if not taped or bagged when recycled.

All types of electronics and batteries can be recycled in Folsom's Door-to-Door Residential Household Hazardous Waste Collection program. Schedule an appointment at www.folsom.ca.us/wastecollection or call 916-461-6730. You can also drop off your old, unwanted batteries at participating Folsom retailers.
