Folsom Pays Tribute to the Nation's Veterans

Although the traditional parade will not take place this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Folsom will still pay tribute to the nation's veterans. On Wednesday, November 11, watch a Veterans Day Commemoration at 9 a.m. on www.facebook.com/FolsomParksandRec. The short video will include segments from past years' parades and brief interviews with local veterans. This



year's honorary Grand Marshal is Ernie Sheldon. Prior to his many years as a member of the Folsom City Council, Ernie served 33 years in the U.S. Air Force. He retired as a much-decorated lieutenant colonel, with a Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, and an Air Force Commendation medal with five clusters. Ernie led the effort to expand Folsom's Veterans

Day Parade, making it one of the largest in the region. He also spearheaded the planning, construction, and design of the city's Veterans Memorial in City Lions Park, behind the library.

FREE COVID-19 TESTING

The Sacramento County Department of Health Services is partnering with UC Davis Health and Folsom-based biotech company StemExpress to provide Community-Based Testing Sites for free COVID-19 testing by appointment for Sacramento County residents. Test results are guaranteed a 72-hour turnaround time, and the process is easy.

- Each site has 200 300 test appointments per day.
- Free tests to Sacramento County residents regardless of insurance or citizenship status.
- Testing is available for children 2 years or older.
- Test results within 72 hours (even on weekends).

The Folsom COVID-19 community testing site is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. every Wednesday at Oak Hills Church, 1100 Blue Ravine Road. To find a testing site and schedule an appointment, visit www.saccounty.net/covid-19.

CITY OF FOLSOM ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PLAN

The city began the Active Transportation Master Plan (ATP) process with the selected consultant, Alta Planning + Design, in August. The ATP will combine and update the master plans for Folsom's pedestrian and bicycle facilities. It will also guide the planning, development, and maintenance of existing and future bicycle and pedestrian facilities within the city, including recommended citywide active transportation network improvements and Safe Routes to School. The purpose of the ATP is to increase bicycling and walking opportunities through the creation of a safe, connected, convenient, and visible active transportation network.

A key component of the ATP process includes an extensive public outreach program with key stakeholder groups and the community. Careful analysis will help ensure the city builds a sustainable active transportation system network that best serves all bicycle and pedestrian facility users citywide, particularly around activity centers like schools, parks, and commercial areas. The ATP is a vital step to increase walking, biking, and non-motorized opportunities throughout Folsom, and to increase safety, mobility, connectivity, and access for all roadway and trail users. The new ATP will make specific recommendations

for strategies, actions, projects, and programs to improve the pedestrian and bicycle environment.

The new ATP will also assist the city in achieving the goals and policies set forth in the General Plan and Climate Action Plan. This planning process will allow the city to better align infrastructure investment with community-based projects. FOLSOM WATER QUALITY EVALUATION REPORT AND ANALYSIS

The City of Folsom Environmental and Water Resources Department received the completed investigation report October 16 from consultant Black & Veatch related to pinhole plumbing leaks in Folsom. The analysis indicates the city meets all State and Federal drinking water standards; however, the purity of Folsom's water combined with a pH above 9.0 and chlorine use could contribute to pitting of copper pipe, especially at sites with impurities in the pipe material or where particulate has settled. Based on the recommendation from Black & Veatch, the city began adding orthophosphate into its water treatment process as a corrosion inhibitor.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

The annual Christmas tree recycling drop-off event will be held Saturday, January 9. Face masks/cloth face coverings are required, and social distancing must be maintained. Trees will be accepted from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Rodeo Park at the end of Stafford Street, All ornaments, tinsel, lights, nails, and stands must be removed before dropping off a tree. Community organizations will collect trees throughout the city as part of their fundraising activities. Residents may also recycle Christmas trees in their green waste bins. Trees must be cut into pieces no larger than two feet in length and four inches in diameter, and the lid must close completely to receive service.

Folsom's Oak Parkway Trail Undercrossing Named Project of the Year

The Sacramento Chapter of the American Public Works Association (APWA) selected Folsom's Oak Parkway Trail Undercrossing as the 2020 Project of the Year in the Parks & Trails category. The annual APWA awards program recognizes public works projects that demonstrate overall excellence in project administration, design, sustainability, community relations, and construction.

The city opened the Oak Parkway Trail Undercrossing for public use in fall of 2019. It provides a seamless and safe route for trail users to transition between two of the city's major trailways – the Oak Parkway and the Johnny Cash trails. It provides cyclists and pedestrians traffic-free access to Folsom's rich Historic District and the regional American River Parkway corridor from the southern parts of the city.

The project also included improvements along E. Natoma Street – traffic barriers, buffered Class II bike lanes, and wide sidewalks on both sides of the street – which contribute to motorist, pedestrian, and cyclist safety.

FIRE PREVENTION WORK ALONG OAK PARKWAY TRAIL

Due to recent wildfires in California, PG&E has expanded their vegetation management programs to include increased distances between their power lines and trees. As a result, Folsom residents and trail users will likely see an increase in tree removals within PG&E's utility corridors. This new tree removal threshold was used by PG&E in June when they removed a large heritage valley oak tree behind St. John the Baptist Catholic Church, along the Oak Parkway Trail.

PG&E has notified the City of Folsom that additional large tree removals

along the Oak Parkway Trail are planned. The city is working with PG&E to ensure disruptions and closures of trails are kept to a minimum. Residents and trails users with questions or concerns about PG&E's activities should call their customer service department at 1-800-743-5000.

REDUCE WASTE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

Help Folsom reduce trash going to the landfill this holiday season.

Place in your recycle can:

- Wrapping paper, tissue, cards, and envelopes
- Food and beverage containers (clean and dry)
- Cardboard boxes (flattened, clean and dry, small enough to fall freely from the can and for the lid to close completely)

Place in your trash can:

- Metallic paper (including tissue with metallic trim)
- Vinyl or mylar wrapping
- Styrofoam
- Ribbons and bows (reuse whenever possible)

Folsom Police Department Offers Vacation Checks

Leaving town for the holidays? The Folsom Police Department Citizens Assisting Public Safety (CAPS) volunteers will check the exterior of your home while you're away. As often as once a day, a CAPS volunteer will walk



the perimeter of your home, check doors and windows to make sure they are locked, and remove any flyers or packages from the front porch. If CAPS volunteers see a problem, they'll notify you and, if appropriate, will have a police officer respond. Vacation checks are offered free of charge to Folsom residents.

HELP KEEP GUTTERS AND STORM DRAINS FREE OF LEAVES

The City of Folsom Public Works
Department continues to diligently
work at clearing gutters and storm
drain inlets of fallen leaves. When
leaves accumulate on the street, it
is challenging for street sweepers to
pick up the leaves, which can clog
storm drain inlets and cause localized
flooding. Here's how you can help:

 Avoid sweeping or blowing leaves into ditches or streets.

- Clear leaves from gutters and storm drains in front of your home or place of business and place them in your green waste container, if possible.
- Keep sidewalks clear of leaves and other debris.

If there is a storm drain inlet that is difficult to clear, or you would like to report a storm drain issue, call the Public Works Street Department at 916-461-6722.

KEEP PIPES FREE OF FATS, OILS, AND GREASE

To help prevent clogged sewer pipes and backups, properly dispose of items containing fats, oils, and grease (FOG)—like fatty meat scraps, gravies, cream, butter, and oils.

- Can It! Pour solidified fats and grease into a sturdy container and place it in your garbage.
- Scrape It! Before you wash pots and pans, scrape out fats and grease into your garbage.
- Trash It! Put fatty and greasy food scraps in the garbage. You

can recycle cooking oil by pouring the cooled oil back into the original container and scheduling an appointment to have it picked up with the city's Door 2 Door Residential Household Hazardous Waste Collection program. The Indian festival of Diwali or Deepavali, also known as the Festival of Lights, is traditionally celebrated with the use of fireworks. The use of approved fireworks in conjunction with this festival may occur between noon Saturday, November 14 through 9 p.m. Sunday, November 15.

The City of Folsom Fire
Department is asking the
public to take the following
precautions when using fireworks
during the festival period:

- Make sure all fireworks have the California State Fire Marshal "Safe and Sane" seal.
- The use of fireworks for this celebration must be conducted under adult supervision at all times.
- Have a bucket of water, sand, or garden hose available where fireworks are being used.
- Read all instructions before use.
- Never alter, modify, or enhance fireworks use only in the manner intended.
- Make sure fireworks have proper clearance from flammable materials including dry grass and brush.



HOUSING ELEMENT UPDATE

The Housing Element of the City of Folsom General Plan identifies housing needs and establishes clear goals and objectives to inform future housing decisions in the city. The State requires that the Housing Element be updated every eight years, and that it must demonstrate the city has sufficient capacity to accommodate the number of housing units identified in the Regional Housing Needs Assessment. City of Folsom Planning staff will release the Draft Housing Element for public review and comment this November, and Planning Commission and City Council public hearings will be scheduled shortly after. WINTER IRRIGATION TIPS

Did you know that landscapes are our largest consumer of water? You can save a substantial amount of water by turning off your sprinklers when the rain begins.

Cooler temperatures and shorter days mean less growth and additional watering is unnecessary, and seasonal rains will provide all the water needed.

Too much water leads to shallow root growth and shallow roots lead to stressed landscapes and increased water use in the spring and summer.
