TIPS ON TRAIL SAFETY FROM THE FOLSOM POLICE DEPARTMENT

Folsom is home to an extensive trail system, with more than 45 miles of trails for walkers, runners and cyclists. As you enjoy Folsom's multiuse trails this spring, the Folsom Police Department offers a few safety tips to remember before you head out.

Bicyclists

- Keep to the right side of the trail
- Yield to pedestrians
- Pass on the left side of oncoming pedestrians/joggers
- Ride at a safe speed; single-file in congested conditions or in areas with reduced visibility

Pedestrians

- Keep to the left side of the trail (facing oncoming cyclists)
- Watch for other trail users
- Maintain single-file in congested conditions and in areas with reduced visibility

Residents are encouraged to join the Folsom Police Department's Dog Walker Watch and help prevent crime on the trails. This special program trains residents who use trails and pathways regularly on how to spot and report suspicious activity. ENJOY A NEW FITNESS EXPERIENCE AT FOLSOM'S RUN WITH NATURE

This year marks more great "firsts" for the 34th annual fitness event on Saturday, May 20—including a new location, and new run and walk courses. What haven't changed are the elements that make this event a favorite annual tradition for so many people: beautiful views, natural scenery, and a family-friendly format.

The race takes place along the Humbug-Willow Creek Trail system, on paved trails surrounded by acres of open space and wetlands.



You'll be amazed that you're in the heart of the city and yet surrounded by beautiful natural scenery!

The course options include a 5.8K fitness walk, 5.8K and 13K chip-timed runs, and a youth half-mile fun run (contained within Cummings Family Park where the other events start and finish). Note: runners on the 13K course will be able to determine their 10K split time with mileage markers.

Registered 5.8K and 13K participants receive a commemorative finisher's medal and T-shirt; the top male and female run finishers will each receive a special prize. Youth fun run participants receive a T-shirt and a raffle ticket. All participants can enjoy post-race festivities including DJ entertainment, refreshments, and vendor booths with information and product samples.

REPORT ABANDONED VEHICLES TO FOLSOM CODE ENFORCEMENT

Abandoned vehicles are an eyesore, contribute to neighborhood blight and are one of the most commonly reported nuisances in the city. Folsom Code Enforcement officers are here to assist with the removal of abandoned, wrecked, inoperative, unregistered and illegally parked vehicles on public property.

While City and State codes allow vehicles to be parked on the public roadway, any vehicle parked in the same location for more than 72 hours is considered a violation. All utility trailers and boat trailers must be attached to the tow vehicle and they must be moved every 72 hours.



Folsom Dispatchers Honored During National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week



Dispatchers are often the first in line in emergency service response—the calming voice you hear when you are hurt, in danger, or need help fast. The week of April 9 is National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, honoring the men and women who answer 911 emergency calls, and dispatch police, fire, and paramedic personnel that provide life-saving assistance.

The City of Folsom's 12 dispatchers handled more than 103,300 calls in 2016, and 98% of those calls were answered within

10 seconds. Folsom dispatchers work in teams of two to ensure emergency responders are ready when every second counts. While one dispatcher responds to emergency calls, the other dispatcher relays the critical information to the appropriate responders.

Folsom Police Department dispatchers will be recognized at the Organization of Public Safety Telecommunicators Week banquet on April 8; Elva Valasek will be named Dispatcher of the Year and Jennie Paranial will receive the Customer Service Award. The celebration will continue throughout the week with special activities, honoring all of the City's dispatchers. Join us in honoring the first responders on the other end of the line.

ORANGEVALE BRIDGE TO REOPEN

The Orangevale Avenue Bridge will reopen this spring after a year-long rehabilitation project on the century-old bridge that connects Folsom and Orangevale.

The historic bridge spans Gold Creek and is located on Orangevale Avenue between Placer Mine Road and American River Canyon Road. An estimated 1,000 vehicles cross the bridge daily.

The rehabilitated Orangevale Avenue Bridge meets current structural standards while preserving the historical character. The project also included utility and sewer upgrades in the area. The \$2.1 million project was funded largely by a federal grant administered by the Caltrans Highway Bridge Program.

The Orangevale Avenue Bridge was originally completed in 1915 to connect Folsom and Orangevale prior to the completion of Greenback Lane in the 1950s.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND ROAD IMPROVEMENTS BEGIN SOUTH OF HIGHWAY 50

An 18-month schedule of infrastructure and road improvements is starting south of Highway 50 for the new Folsom Ranch plan area—3,513 acres annexed into the City of Folsom in 2012. This spring and summer, construction activities will include infrastructure and safety improvements such as water, sewer, streets and utilities, plus temporary closures and detours of Placer-ville Road and Scott Road. An east-west connector will be built between those roads, eventually running parallel to Highway 50, similar to Iron Point Road to the north. The Sacramento Municipal Utility District will build a substation to serve the area with electrical power. Traffic safety and detour signs will be posted.

Planned in accordance with Measure W, a ballot measure passed by Folsom voters, land owners were required to secure an independent water supply for the plan area, provide transportation improvements to mitigate traffic impacts, preserve 30 percent of the land as natural open space, and allow for new schools—all at no cost to existing Folsom residents. The plan that met those requirements was adopted by the Folsom City Council in 2012.

The plan area was the subject of a visioning process instituted by the City with hundreds of residents at dozens of public hearings addressing a range of issues including land use, open space, transportation, and financing. Their recommendations resulted in scenarios reviewed by the Folsom City Council in 2005, which ultimately evolved into the design adopted in 2012.

Highlights of the plan area include 835 contiguous acres of oak woodlands, 120 acres of community parks, a vibrant town center, new homes, transit improvements

to mitigate traffic impacts from the plan area, up to 8,000 high quality jobs, and a new high school, middle school and elementary schools.
