

A Wild Holiday Celebration at the Folsom City Zoo Sanctuary

Now in its seventh year, Wild Nights and Holiday Lights – the Folsom City Zoo Sanctuary's popular holiday event – is a wonderful way for families to celebrate the season. It's also an opportunity to see how many of the animals behave after dark.

Many hours of hands-on work by local families, businesses, community groups and city staff go into installing the lights, decorations and displays that make this event so special.

Santa Claus visits each night of the event, and local caroling groups and musicians provide the festive sounds of the season. The Folsom Valley Railway miniature live steam train provides special nighttime rides for kids and adults.

Wild Nights and Holiday Lights is open from 5 to 8 p.m. on December 2-3, 9-10 and 16-23 (weather permitting; Zoo Sanctuary closed in heavy rains). Admission is \$5 per person; free for ages two and under. Train tickets are \$4 per person. On December 21 from 5 to 8 p.m., the Food Truck Safari takes place next to the Zoo Sanctuary in Folsom City Lions Park.

Winter Conservation Tips

When it's raining, conserving water may be the last thing that comes to mind. But water conservation should be a daily, year-round habit for all of us. Here are some tips and ideas on how to conserve water this winter:

GIVE YOUR SPRINKLERS A HOLIDAY

Your yard shouldn't need any supplemental water this winter, so turn off your sprinklers and let Mother Nature do the watering for you. While we take a break from watering the lawn, now is a great time to conserve water indoors.

- Install high-efficiency appliances such as toilets, showerheads, faucets, dishwashers, and clothes washers.
- · Limit showers to five minutes or less and turn off the faucet when shaving or brushing your teeth
- Check plumbing and appliances for leaks and fix them within 48 hours.

H2OLIDAY WATER-SAVING IDEAS

Have a bunch of housequests for the holidays? Throwing some big dinner parties? Here are ideas for a fun and water-efficient holiday season.

- · Scrape the dishes into the trash instead of using the sink's garbage disposal.
- Save water and energy by letting your frozen food thaw in the microwave or overnight in the fridge, instead of running water over it.
- A full household means extra laundry and dishes. Remember to run your clothes washer or dishwasher only when full. If you're in the market for new appliances, look for the Water-Sense label. You'll save water and energy each time you use them.
- Run your dishwasher on the "light wash" setting, which can cut water use by 55 percent and work just as well for most loads.
- Wash fruits and vegetables in a small pan instead of rinsing under running water.

• If you're using the good china or silverware that requires hand washing, fill one basin with soapy water and the other with rinse water rather than letting the faucet run.

THE JOHNNY CASH TRAIL EXPANDS

The Folsom City Council recently awarded the construction contract for the second phase of the Johnny Cash Trail to Westcon Construction, Inc. Weston's bid was the lowest of the four bids received. In 2014, Westcon built the first installment of the trail as well as the Johnny Cash Bridge. Phase II includes 1.25 miles of Class I paved trail, an undercrossing tunneling beneath Prison Road to allow trail users to safely bypass vehicular traffic, and a beautiful 190-foot wooden arched bridge that will provide views of the American River Canyon, Lake Natoma, and beyond. The project also includes a paved trail spur for prison employees that starts at Natoma Street and ends at the employee parking lot near the prison museum. When completed in fall of 2017, Phase II of the Johnny Cash Trail will connect to existing trail in Digger and Sharon Williams Rodeo Park, providing cyclists, runner and walkers a convenient route to access Folsom's Historic District. Funding for the \$3.23 million project is provided by a variety of federal grants and local transportation funds.

Volunteers Needed for Citizens Assisting Public Safety Program

Looking for a challenging, fun way to contribute to the community while helping reduce crime and increase public safety services to Folsom? The Citizens Assisting Public Safety (CAPS) program may be the opportunity for you.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS

The Folsom CAPS volunteers assist the Police and Fire Departments with various functions. You can often spot the volunteers driving around town conducting vacation checks or patrolling parking lots as extra eyes and ears for the Police Department. They are also commonly seen helping with public education and safety fairs, working at the front counters, assisting with traffic control during parades and DUI checkpoints, and leading the city's Neighborhood Watch, Business Watch, and Dog Walker Watch programs.

CAPS volunteers must complete the Citizens Academy and pass an extensive background check. The Citizens Academy is an annual

11-week academy from March to May that provides an indepth look at the Folsom Police and Fire Departments and other city services. Applications for the Citizens Academy become available each January. HOLIDAY RECYCLING AND TREE DISPOSAL

Residents can recycle their holiday packaging materials by placing them in their blue recycling carts. Acceptable items include wrapping paper, tissue paper, cardboard boxes, cards and other paper packaging materials. Bows and ribbons can be reused and Christmas trees can be cut up and placed in green waste carts as long as the lid is completely closed.

The City will also be holding its annual Christmas Tree Recycling Drop-off Event on Saturday, January 7. Trees will be accepted from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Rodeo Park at the end of Stafford Street. All ornaments and stands must be removed before dropping off a tree. Boy Scouts will help residents unload trees and will also be collecting trees throughout the City as part of their fundraising activities.

As a reminder, the City collects garbage, green waste, and recycling on all holidays so place carts out on your normal collection day.

Keep Pipes Free of Fats, Oils and Grease this Holiday Season

The holidays are a time for families and friends to share a hearty home-cooked meal together, and the City of Folsom's Environmental and Water Resources Department wants to remind residents to dispose of food properly.

Fats, oils and grease—also known as FOG—can clog sewer pipes and cause overflows. Food items such as butter, gravy, meat fats, sour cream, ice cream and salad dressings are considered FOG. Properly disposing of FOG will help avoid expensive plumber visits, prevent blockages in the City's sewer system and protect our waterways.

Always place cooled oil and grease into trash bins or covered collection containers, use a strainer in the sink to collect excess food particles, scrape food scraps from dishes into trash bins, and manually wipe off all visible FOG residue from dishes and cookware into trash bins.
